This full-day workshop will cover all steps involved in monoprinting with MX dyes, including setting up the work space; preparing dye and soda ash solutions; printing, and finishing the fabrics. Students will start out working with one color on layer-cake size fabrics to get familiar with the way the tools, dyes, and fabric work together, and the steps required to get a good print. You will quickly move on to working larger, combining tools, colors, and techniques to get a wide range of artistic effects. By noon you will have tried a variety of dye application methods and mark-making techniques, and the afternoon will be devoted to production. You can expect to print about 6 yards of printed fabric over the course of the day. Participants will be provided with information about purchasing and prepping their fabric at home prior to class.

Under the initiative, known as Sister Artists, survivors have produced around 40 embroidered blocks depicting their life in Mali. Many of the quilt artists are SAQA members and live in the New England area.

The quilts will be on display at the New England Quilt Museum (neqm.org) April 1 to April 4. The quilt on the right, A Day in the Life by Tricia Deck, is one of the 40 quilts that will be on display


The Great American Road Trip fiber art series will be on display the the Mill 180 Indoor Park in Easthampton MA March 14 - April 2 2020



Seeing Torah is a visual diary documenting artist Anita Rabinoff-Goldman's study and artistic response to each of the 54 portions of the Torah over the cycle of a single Jewish year. Each piece is a visual midrash in the tradition of Jewish creative commentary–imaginative re-envisionings as seen through a woman's lens illuminating the spiritual, political, and feminist lessons living in the Torah. Accompanied by a short commentary, every piece allows viewers to consider how Torah can be a continuing source of learning and discourse and reflect on what it means to them.

News from Julie Neu

Starting with the shooting at Columbine High School on April 20, 1999, Julie made a block with the name of each victim of the shootings in which more than ten people died at once, using the state flag of the shooting location as her design inspiration. She

sewed the blocks together to create one quilt for each massacre. To date, she has made 343 blocks in 16 quilts. This exhibit includes all 16 quilts, as well as "Bullet Holes," in which 862 holes represent victims of mass shooting events large and small from 1990 to 2019, and "In Our Sights," which includes pages from The New York Times covering the shooting in Las Vegas in 2017.

Ann says, "One problem I used to have when I left the studio for a period of time was trying to decide what to work on next. Frequently I would have lost the rhythm and inspiration I had before I left and I would have become anxious about the next project. For me an easy solution is to make sure I have something to work on when I return. Maybe I leave a smaller project that needs finishing. Or I lay out the colors for a larger undertaking. That way I can do something that will work as I get back into the rhythm of the studio."
